

What brings you joy? A new puppy with snuggly fur and a bundle of bouncy energy? Good coffee and conversation with a dear friend? Your favorite team pulling off a big win? Peppermint Milkshakes? Christmas is often called 'the most wonderful time of the year.' With twinkling lights, festive music, tasty treats, colorful gift wrap, programs and parties, there are many joyful things going on, but these things come and go in a month. Sometimes it doesn't take much to scratch beneath the surface and see that our joy is running on empty because of broken relationships, health challenges, or frustrating circumstances.

Where can we find Joy that lasts beyond the season? In Luke 2:8-20 we read the story of some unsuspecting shepherds watching over their sheep on a hillside. Suddenly the dark of night was pierced by the overwhelming glory of the Lord. The shepherds were terrified, and the voice of the Angel of the Lord rang out, 'Fear not, for behold I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people.'

How is it possible that the arrival of a baby could bring great joy for all people?! Of course, the answer comes next. This was not any baby, this was the promised Savior, Christ the Lord – in a name - Jesus.

Christmas is a season of great joy, not because of all the festivities (although those can be very nice indeed), and not because all our problems go away (there's a difference between joy and happiness). Christmas is a season of great joy because the arrival of Jesus means that our sins can be forgiven, our relationship with God can be restored, and we can have renewed hope and purpose beyond this life in Him.

The arrival of Jesus means that we can have Joy through the challenges of this life because God keeps his promises, He sees us, and He is with us.

# **DISCUSSION QUESTIONS**


- What brings you joy?
