

A Hopeful Perspective (Psalm 13)

How do you view King David? More often than not, we see him as a King, as blessed, as a hero, a wise ruler, and a military genius. Many of you see him as a man after God's own heart, or maybe some of you see him as a sinner. In addition to all of those things, David suffered, and we do too.

How often do we think of David as a suffering victim? David doesn't claim a victim identity, yet David could have taken that identity. He could have seen himself as a victim of both his and others actions. He suffered greatly, and he expressed that to God. Think about the suffering and brokenness David endured:

- He was deemed insignificant by his family (1 Samuel 16:1–13).
- · Was the target of a King's Rage, and subject of abuse (1 Samuel 18:6-18).
- · Had to flee his home and future kingdom for his safety (1 Samuel 19-23).
- · Lost a best friend due to conflict with Saul (1 Samuel 20).
- David's baby died (2 Samuel 12:15-17).
- · Had a son (Amnon) who sinned grievously against his sister (2 Samuel 13:1–21)
- Absalom another of David's had Amnon killed to avenge his sister (2 Samuel 13:23-38).
- · Later, Absalom betrays David and tries to steal the kingdom from him (2 Samuel 15–19).

The list could go on.

In Psalm 13, David expresses his suffering to God. The reader can sense his confusion. Rather than allowing his feelings to influence his relationship with God, he allows facts to shape his feelings. He knows God saves him, cares for him, and has brought him from darkness and into light. David knew that his identity didn't rest in what was done to him, but what was done for him. He knew God was there to redeem his life in the middle of the most hopeless situations. David chose to trust in God and to rejoice in hope.

At Christmas, we look to this same hope, and we know that this hope is in the King who David pointed to—Jesus. Jesus is the perfect king who never failed. In many ways David failed, but Jesus will never fail. Although Jesus was perfect, he suffered greatly. It's through his wounds our suffering will one day end. No matter what we are going through, we can turn to the Lord choosing to trust him because he has dealt bountifully with us. We can change our perspective. Let him comfort you with his eternal hope this Christmas season.


 Is there anything that particularly stood out to you from the sermon?
